Faith Notes from Rev. Pam: The Best Is Yet to Come?

I recently read an article that really struck a chord with me. Written by the pastor of a small church in England – where the church is basically in collapse – it focuses on what is POSSIBLE for church instead of what is failing. He writes that we need to remember that:



"...it's possible to believe that in Christ the future is bigger than the past. So much of the church... is limping sadly, like a puppy with a sore paw... [But] Christianity is founded on two convictions: the forgiveness of sins, which maintains the past can be healed by the Holy Spirit; and everlasting life, which claims our future with Christ has no end. Congregations love to tell stories of good things and noble deeds that have happened in their midst. But the best and most prophetic thing... [is to believe] the future is bigger than the past. That's what makes it an energized and inspiring community. We don't know, but we're learning. We haven't arrived, but the journey's great. We're not sure exactly where we're going, but it's getting better all the time. We've had wonderful experiences in the past, but the best is yet to come."

What an inspiration! To look back with gratitude on what God has already accomplished through the congregation while at the same time looking hopefully forward into the future God is still dreaming is a bold, courageous, confident, faithful way to livel

Here is what I know: 1) things in a community NEVER stay static, they are continually changing; 2) "outside" changes in a community ALWAYS create "inside" changes in churches, schools, and all other organizations/institutions in the community; 3) those that do NOT change in response to community shifts often face becoming irrelevant and losing hope; 4) EVERY time circumstances changed in the community of God's people — from Abraham onward — God changed the plan for our salvation just enough to keep the relationship between God and God's people tilted toward their future together, tilted toward hope. The fact of Jesus makes this abundantly clear — God would go to any length to assure a future with hope!

So, my friends — "How then shall we live?" Can we live comfortable enough with change to anticipate with great hope and excitement what God may be ready to do with us and through us? As the pastor I refer to above reflected, "our church communities have many blessings, a great deal to enjoy and to be proud of — and a lot to learn!"

Do we confidently believe our best years are still ahead? Do we look with hope to the potential that yet lies within, untapped? Are we ready and willing to embrace a humble, learning attitude? Like the Carpenters' 1970 hit, can we claim with joy and energy, "We've only just begun!"? "Easter People"—"People of the Resurrection"—will shout a bold "YES!"



Words to Ponder...

Our Hymnal is a rich treasury of prayers and psalms and creeds in addition to the wonderful hymns we sing in worship week by week. Sometimes I "hear" the words of a particular hymn better if I read the hymn as a poem-prayer instead of singing, as I'm often so concerned about the tune that the words don't sink in, somehow. From time to time, one hits me "new" and I love to ponder what the lyrics teach us about God and how they reinforce our faith. The following hymn – "How Can We Name a Love" (#111) – was written by Brian Wrenn in 1973. Read it here, and ponder what it teaches us about God's always and ever-present love.

How Can We Name a Love?

How can we name a Love that wakens heart and mind, Indwelling all we know or think or do or seek or find? Within our daily world, in every human face, Love's echoes sound and God is found, hid in the commonplace.

If we awoke to life built on a rock of care
That asked no great reward but firm, assured, was simply there,
We can, with parents' names, picture and then adore,
Love unconfined, a father kind, a mother strong and sure.

When people share a task, and strength and skills unite In projects old or new, to make or do with shared delight Our Friend and Partner's will is better understood, That all should share, create, and care, and know that life is good.



Trip to Little Sparrows Mission Planned in October

Plans are firming up for a team of folks from Mogadore United Methodist Church to travel to Iaeger, West Virginia to offer some time and support to the various ministries of the Little Sparrows Mission. Iager is in the heart of McDowell County. West Virginia, said to be the poorest county in America. It is high in former coal-mining territory and remote from most conveniences and assistance. Little Sparrows fills some of the gaps in peoples' lives, especially for the children there who have so little.

Our team may help sort/distribute food, clothing, or lunches; we may have a couple repair/construction jobs to take on; we may make some one-on-one visits to check the general well-being of folks who don't get around much. It will be unpredictable and challenging... and we're sure to meet God in the effort!

Tentatively, we plan to travel on Sunday, October 16, to spend three nights and to return to Mogadore on Wednesday, October 19. We will be sharing expenses for food, water, and gasoline, and we plan to take a "love offering" for the work of Little Sparrows from the proceeds of the Summer Festival booth, which all of you so generously supported.

The coordinators of the ministry there report that there is always a need for blankets, personal hygiene items, clothing, food, and other items folks need for daily life. Space allowing, we will take your donations with us and we will plan to make further purchases there or make additional contributions for the leaders there to purchase what is most needed.

It's not too late to decide you'd like to be part of this mission! The team will meet to do specific planning on Sunday, September 18 immediately after worship. Please prayerfully consider this opportunity!

TIME-OUT: Refreshment time in the Fellowship Hall.


